TRAINING REPORT

etting to grips with this new role has been demanding. I have met dozens of new members at the Appointments Evenings - to advise them about their training needs for their new roles in Scouting. To complete this task we have developed a small team: Sarah Cruickshank has helped with Getting Started as my technical support - with video clips and screen shots of HQ and Lonsdale websites and how to access online training. She has also helped to create some interactive sections of the course. We have delivered the modules 1, 2 and 3 to 44 new members. Carolyn Blyth has continued delivering Safeguarding Training - we've reached 66 members with this essential subject.

Another essential subject for all members either as refresher or brand new is First Aid. Dan Horton has delivered several full day sessions; we have reached 54 members during 2014.

Members of the training team have also helped as facilitators for County Courses held in Lonsdale. Our new leaders have all been keen applicants on such County Courses.

Validation of training is the final essential part and involves the member and a training advisor having a discussion after the training event - asking and answering certain key questions to see if the course hit the mark and did in fact help the new leader in their scouting role. We have a good spread of validators throughout the District and have done nearly 100 validations throughout the year. All this work has created paperwork and record keeping has been competently done by our training admin Tony Barker. The completion of training results in Wood Badge being awarded. We've achieved 14 this year and there are more in the pipeline.

ACTIVITIES REPORT

ith the greater emphasis on Scouting getting outdoors and taking part in engaging and exciting activities this has been a busy year.

Lonsdale leaders have been busy being assessed for, renewing, or upgrading activity permits. New or upgraded permits have been given to leaders in canoeing, caving, climbing, dinghy sailing, hill walking, kayaking, power boating, rowing, and yachting - all of which enable more young people to take part in, and enjoy, adventurous activities, led in a safe and exciting way by suitable qualified instructors. In 2015 there will be an even greater emphasis on adventure, so plans have been made to offer more opportunities for leaders to train and be assessed for adventurous activity permits.

During the course of the year, there has been ongoing support to the Activity Centres Management Board to improve the activities being offered at Littledale and SIlverhelme. The climbing crag at Silverhelme has been inspected and routes cleared of vegetation, while dangerous loose rocks have been identified and fenced off. There has been a big push to improve the offer of shooting for groups in Lonsdale. In May there was a shooting leaders' course, when six Lonsdale leaders were trained and successfully assessed for the National Small-bore Rifle Association YPS Tutor Award. Meanwhile, significant improvements were made to the shooting range to enable safe shooting to take place, with a range of different targets which will enable young people to try out shooting and then to progress in the sport.

During the year, leaders were trained in safety management through running the National Water Safety Management Programme for leaders who operate in, on, or near water margins, and also the British Canoeing Foundation Safety and Rescue Training. Through these two courses a total of 15 leaders have gained more skills in keeping young people safe during water activities.

In July a group of Lonsdale Explorers undertook a Gold DofE expedition in canoes, travelling the River Tay, the longest river in the UK, from Killin to Perth over five days. They had to negotiate one of the biggest lochs in Scotland, and travel via some serious rapids at Grandtully and on other stretches of the river, while wild camping on the river bank each night. All completed their expedition successfully with the support of the ADC Activities who provided training for, and supervision during, the expedition.
