

PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

When I sat down to write a piece for last year's AGM report, I remember commentingthat the growth in our organisation during 2015 had been a great feather in Lonsdale's cap. And while I was writing, I remember thinking that maybe we were close to reaching the peak of our growth, for the time being, and that while 2016 wouldn't see numbers reduce, it might possibly see them remain fairly static.

How wrong could I have been? A year on, and our membership has increased again, and is now at its highest point ever, with a growth in youth membership of 6% - bringing the total membership of young people and adults to 1949, and making us the third biggest district in West Lancs.

So we are now able to celebrate a fifth consecutive year of membership growth, and while doing so, recognise that this has been achieved by excellent leadership from the District Team, as well as the continued commitment and enthusiasm of our adult volunteers who all keep their eyes and ears open for opportunities for expansion, and are often also able to identify possible areas where extra support may be needed.

This past year, of 2016, was certainly be one of celebration - not only the 100th Anniversary ofCouts Scouts and the 30th Anniversary of Beaver Scouts but also another year of growth, for us. We are now bigger, in this District, than we have ever been. Unlike some other organisations, I know of, we are committed to looking forward and identifying areas where there is no youth provision - and then doing something about it. We also support Groups currently facing challenges - be that of leader shortage, lack of support or a programme refresh.



CUB SCOUT CENTENARY

What an amazing year 2016 was for our 8 to 11 year old Cub Scouts! We barely had time to sew on all the badges achieved, before another adventure was on its way.

It all started with a Snow Ball Fight. Lonsdale Cubs enjoyed a Snow Day at Rossendale: skiing and sledging, and guess what, they even had real snow! It was brilliant!

In our Centenary Year it was right that we paid tribute to all those people who made 100 years of Cub Scouting possible, so we held a 'Thank You' event in The Winter Gardens in Morecambe. This event showcased Cub Scouting in Lonsdale and gave us the opportunity to thank those who have been part of the section, and its success, over the last 100 years. We were even joined by the Mayor of Lancaster who enjoyed making rope out of toilet paper, sampling arm-pit fudge and firing rockets - to name but a few activities that were on display during the day.

In February, we needed five coaches to transport some very excited Cub Scouts to take over Blackpool Pleasure Beach - along with 8000 other Cub Scouts from across the North West Region and beyond. This was the first time in the history of the Pleasure Beach that exclusive access had been granted. The persistent rain didn't dampen anybody's spirits as we spent the day smiling and laughing: riding roller-coasters, going on the log-flume and having lots of fun. The UK Chief Commissioner, Wayne Bulpitt, joined us for the day along with Cat Smith our local MP and now Scoutfing Ambassador (who rode on the toboggan ride with some of our Cub Scouts!).

April saw us lacing up our boots, and hiking up Farieton Fell. It was a l'abulously attended event that saw lots of tired and weary Cubs at the end of the day, but with yet another badge to find time to sew on.

After a very well attended District Challenge Day, 16th Lancaster Maclean and Caton Church Cub Scout Sections went on to be 1st and 2nd in the County Centenary Competition. We were all very proud of them, but then again, we always knew we were the best!

When Disney re-made The Jungle Book into a blockbuster movie, their marketing team got it right when they released it in 2016. This was too good an opportunity to miss (due to the historic links with the book and it's influence on the Cub Scout Section), so a trip to Vue Cinema was arranged. Lonsdale Cubs took over two screens to have an exclusive viewing.

One of the Highlights of the year was The County Cub Camp. The theme was about decades in the last 100 years and Lonsdale were given the challenge of delivering bases around the 1936 to 1946 era. The leaders embraced the task in true Lonsdale fashion and the bases were enjoyed by all of the 1500 young people. The Camp Badge Design Competition was won by one of our very own Lonsdale Cub Scouts and we very nearly won the Leader Tug-of-War, but were thwarted in the final by a very strong Blackpool Team.

With lots of other events taking part throughout the year, it all culminated in the most important event of the year, The Promise Party at the Ashton Hall. Balloons, a disco, singing and games, built us up into a frenzy for the renewing of the Promise. As we linked up with other Districts across the County, the Cub Section renewed their promise exactly 100 years to the day it all started. The Ashton Memorial was lift up in Green and Yellow to mark the day, and we had cake, lots of cake. We celebrated more Cub Scouts achieving their Chief Scout Silver Awards than ever before and even more Cubs starting their Scouting adventure.


We didn't just test their survival and physical skills this year; we put their minds to the test, too. Our first

ACTIVITY CENTRES

Both of our sites were well used during the past year both by Scout Groups from Lonsdale as well as scouts from around the country. Guides, schools and other youth groups have also used our facilities - many taking part in Dolf Award Expeditions. There were 81 bookings for Littledale and 114 for Silverhelme. We count a booking as one group of young people - whether they camp and/or use the indoor accommodation. In total, we had 1,971 visitors to Littledale and 2,925 visitors to Silverhelme.

The lodges (indoor accommodation) at both sites have had new, more efficient heating boilers fitted, with much more work done to improve the general condition of the buildings. At Littledale the washnooms have been refurbished, the rooms painted, as has the outside. At Silverhelme the floor has been renewed in parts and showers replaced. A great deal has also been done in the outdoor areas This includes both general and reactive maintenance plus tidying-up to improve the overall appearance of each site. At Littledale the chapel has been

latter, unfortunate incident lead to us receiving great support from the community (following news of the event in the local press).

At long last, after a wait of about eight years, the toilet block at Silverhelme is to be replaced. Work is programmed to start at the end of August 2017, with the demolition of the existing building; the whole project is to be completed by the end of the year.

Overall, both sites are looking better than ever. Most of the work has been carried out by our wardens and their teams of volunteers (thus keeping the running costs down). We are very fortunate to have Mick Woods at Littledale and Kieron Ryan at Silverhelme each in the warden's role. Finally, bookings are continuing to come in - efficiently dealt with by our Bookings Secretary, Dorothy Ryan.

The sites are in use nearly every week end of the year; our aim is to provide an enjoyable and safe environment for young people to enjoy the great outdoors.
